Letter From The Editor

So it happened; Black Rock City 2020 is cancelled. Next year actually was better. We knew it would be, and it stings just the same. The bad news is that we won't be returning to the playa this year, but you already knew that. I'd like to take these pages to focus on the good news.

The good news is that you get to take a year off. If you're like me, this is something you may have considered doing already, but not yet followed through on due to a sense of obligation to your camp, a fear of missing out, or whatever other excuses we make for ourselves. You can do that now. You will do that now.

The good news is that "taking a year off Burning Man" doesn't have to mean taking a year off Burning Man if you don't want it to. Black Rock City won't be built this year, but Burning Man is more than just a temporary city in the middle of the desert. If you feel so inclined, I would encourage you to find an activity that allows you to feel involved with Burning Man in the absence of the event itself. For me, that activity is the production of this magazine. For you, it may be creating art for BRC 2021, learning a new skill to take to the playa next year, or making a concerted effort to uphold the Ten Principles at a time when your community needs it most.

Like building Black Rock City, the work is hard but rewarding, and it gives me a sense that I'm giving back to Black Rock's citizens, even though we're apart. I hope the same is true for you.

The good news is that every day is Burning Man now. Filtered masks are a common sight, and I'm seeing more and more cyclists enjoying the outdoors in the absence of gyms and public entertainment. Communal effort and civic responsibility are no longer niceties; they are an essential component in derisking our society of the threats posed by a global pandemic. Consider Burning Man 2020: The Multiverse to be Schrodinger's Burn: simultaneously happening and not happening. Whether or not you open the box is up to you.

What this means for Burning Man. It's a rocky road forward for Burning Man project in 2020. Even as the refund portal is rolled out, the project may completely deplete their cash reserve and *still* face a budget deficit of around \$10 million. (Read Burning Man Project's full article on their 2020 financials at journal.burningman.org/2020/04/news/global-news/2020-financials.)

Marian Goodell recently appealed to burners to donate a portion (or totality) of ticket costs back to Burning Man Project, so that they can continue to operate throughout 2020 and into the future. In the absence of gifting on playa this year, I intend to give the full value of my ticket back to Burning Man. While I understand that many are out a source of income at the moment, I urge those of you who are in a position to do so to do the same.

What this means for The Intergalactic Observer. As a volunteer-operated, non-profit publication, The Intergalactic Observer is not reliant on revenues to continue its operation. We are, however, heavily reliant on the event itself. Our stories, our humor, the images we publish, and the people we interview are all sourced from the playa.

The absence of Black Rock City in 2020 puts us in a somewhat precarious position in that we are soon to run short on content to publish. If you have images from Burning Man, an art project you're involved with, or a story to tell, please, please, reach out to us at observer@intergalactic.camp. We'd love to meet you.

The Man burns in 486 days. I'll see you then.

Deep Playa with Katie Swalm: Monumental Mammoth

Tahoe Mack is a Las Vegas native and the visionary behind Monumental Mammoth, an 18-foot tall sculpture made of scrap metal littered in the Tule Springs Fossil Bed. The Mammoth was created to raise awareness on the importance of protecting the national monument. She conceived the project to achieve the Girl Scout Gold Award and partnered with local artists Luis Varela-Rico and Dana Albany to design and build the sculpture. The project has raised over \$250,000 in in-kind donations and cash, and involved over 100 volunteers.

In what ways did Girl Scouts influence you and your art?

Girl Scouts has been an empowering force that really challenged me to make my mark on the world. It allowed me to see a world full of endless possibilities, regardless of sex and age. I can't thank the program enough.

What are you studying now?

I am studying Business and Art at the University of Oregon. I am a freshman.

Monumental Mammoth is a sculpture of incredible scale. How long did it take and how did you choose your partner artists?

The total project has been in the works for three years now. We are still getting her ready for placement, so the timeline is still ongoing!

I had the idea for the project and just started asking people in the community that had connections to artists. I was introduced to Luis Varela-Rico by Pam Stuckey with Renewable Envoy. We had one meeting with him and I just knew he was the perfect fit. At the time, I had no metal-working experience, so I really didn't know the qualifications I was looking for in a partner. I am still blown away with his skill, artistic abilities, precision, talent, and work ethic. We were really lucky to be able to work with him. Dana Albany was introduced to us by Maria Partridge. I had only seen her pieces "The Gatekeeper" and "Tara" for about two seconds and knew that she was the perfect fit for this project. Her unique style is so ornate and complex; she truly knows how to make one's trash into beautiful treasure. She has the most beautiful, giving heart, and it was a true blessing to work with her.

Were there any challenges your team had to overcome when creating Monumental Mammoth?

I think convincing my mom and Sherri that the mammoth was really going to happen, and at life-sized scale, was a huge challenge. We obviously moved past that. Other than that, I can't really pinpoint any huge battles we had to conquer for the project, but it was not easy by any means. I personally grew a lot during these four years and I was able to take on more as I gained more skills. There were hours and hours of endless meetings and emails, as well as laborious days and nights working on the mammoth dusk, even while I was in school.

Tell us about your inspiration for the project.

The inspiration for the Monumental Mammoth began from a story I heard from my mentor, Sherri Groother, about five women who set out to preserve the Tule Springs National Monument. I felt that the time and passion that they put into preserving the past should be remembered, but not through a plaque somewhere on the monument. Also, a statement about how we are responsible for the trash littered on the monument itself for generations; it's our job to protect it, but the mammoth became so much more than that. It symbolizes a community who have become family to me, one that I was searching for in Vegas. We have had hundreds of volunteers and hands touch the mammoth; they are all a part of that story and, when she is installed, she will share that story with the visitors.

How did you feel when you found out the piece would make it to Burning Man, Life Is Beautiful, and eventually come to live in Ice Age Fossil State Park?

The plan to have her placed at the state park was the initial goal for the project; but the festivals just added to the mammoth's "Nevada tour". I am still feeling. I am still taking it all in. It's still a shock.

How has your own life been changed from the project?

The mammoth was my life for three years. It really embodies everything that I value. From the time the project began until now, I have transformed tremendously. I feel empowered and capable to enact change through what I create. I know the importance of community now and what it means to be a part of a team.

Do you have any other art pieces in the works?

College at the moment. But I am always brewing up ideas and I have high hopes for the future of my artistic endeavors.

Charly Wolney interviews Connor Maggzz of Circadian Riff

How did you get started in music production?

I actually have very little formal training in music, but I was immediately fascinated with sound design after hearing a Prodigy album my father gave me when I was a kid. Along the same lines, he gave me an Oingo Boingo CD that really super charged my interest in dark, ominous, wavy styles of theatrical music. The moment I figured out how people were creating stuff like this digitally, I went straight down the rabbit hole.

If someone asked to be your apprentice and learn everything that you know, what would you teach them?

- If you're missing a hand and you have a nub, people will ask you how many people you've fucked with it.
- Music is so much more than theory.
- The journey is just as, if not more, important as the destination.
- Literally no one knows anything about why we're actually here. If they claim to, you're dealing with either a narcissist or a cult leader... same thing I guess?
- Fuck what people think of you.
- Being patient with people is of the utmost importance.
- If it makes you happy, chase the ever-loving fuck out of it.
- Please, for fucks sake, if you like going to shows, wear earplugs.
- Understand that everyone grows at different paces. Keep your eyes forward and not to the left or the right.

What's the closest thing to real magic?

DMT i'd think. Also anything that you can really determine by a gut feeling. Shit's trippy how that lil' second brain in your belly can sense what the fuck is really happening.

What first interested you about going to Burning Man? How many Burns have you attended?

My first burn was in 2017. I was dating this amazing girl that was a champ at festival work. She got a gig with Center Camp being a shift leader and they were looking to fill a core crew role for a "Master Brewer". My dumb ass signed up immediately not really knowing what I was in for. Luckily everyone there was super kind and put up with my antics. One thing I learned very quickly: brewing coffee for wooks at 4 a.m. while hungover is something special. Also I think carrying around a mannequin arm everywhere I went really worked well as an ice breaker for new folks. Also throwing it at people.. Folks don't really seem to know what the fuck to do when a guy with one arm throws a mannequin arm at you.

I've attended every burn since 2017 and I anticipate going every year possible. The first year I stayed with Cafe village and I luckily met the whole ISV crew thanks to the amazing Michelle Gargano that allowed me to play! Out of every camp I had visited, ISV was my absolute favorite.

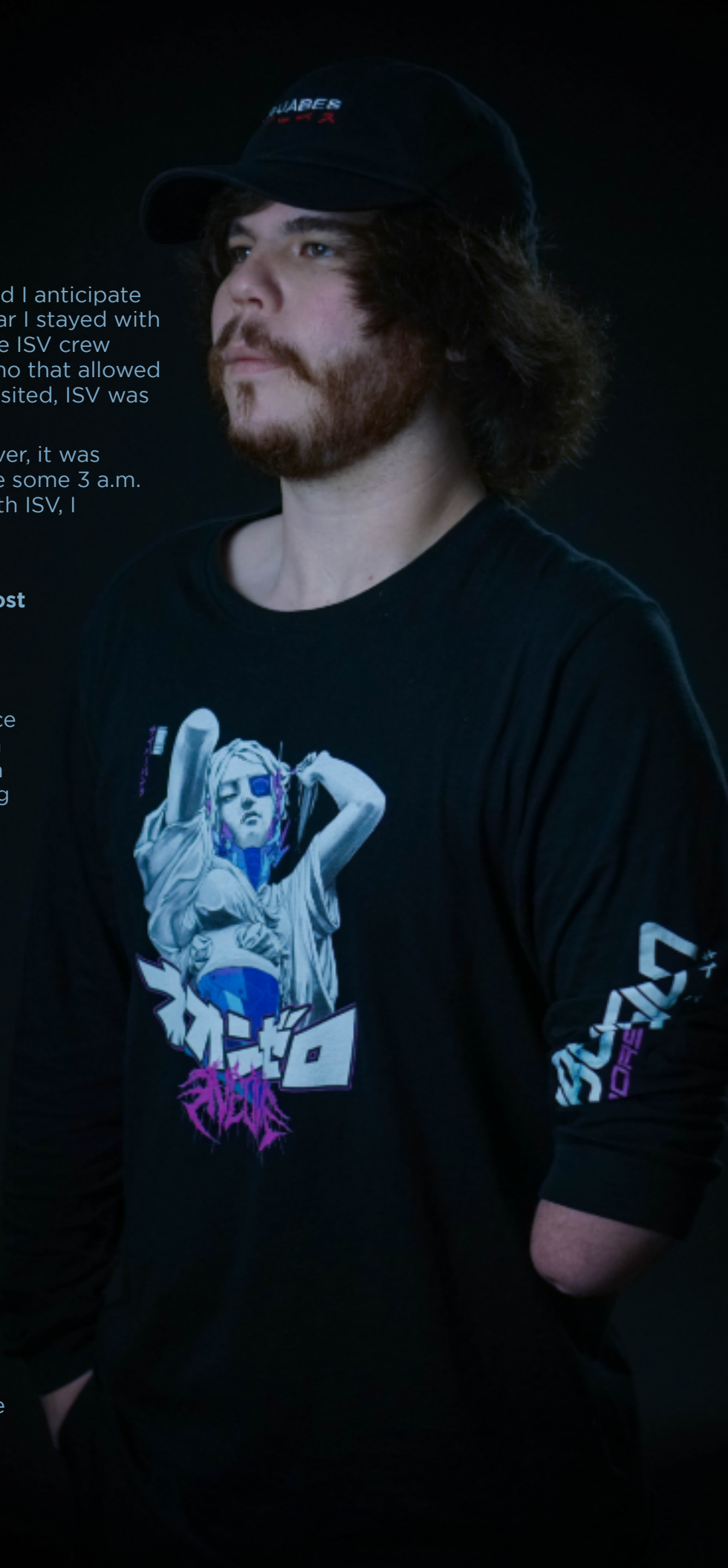
I liked staying with Cafe Village; however, it was incredibly quiet at night and I need me some 3 a.m. shenanigans. The first year I stayed with ISV, I knew I was home.

You have 5 minutes to explain the most "Burning Man of Burning Man" experience you've ever had. Go!

I have two:

I think the best Burning Man experience was playing Camp Questionmark? at a prime-time slot. There must have been at least 1,000 to 2,000 people listening to my music. I got a real taste of what it's like to play in front of a massive crowd. Hands (and nubs) down the craziest experience of my life. It was like my weiner got hit with a lightning bolt.

The second experience was at the end of the burn in 2019. Everyone was packing up and it was the night before exodus. I was walking back to my ShiftPod and I noticed Kodiak sitting in a lawn chair staring at the camp porto's. Curious, I decided to join him without the context. Shortly thereafter, I saw someone enter the porto we were positioned in front of. Chris immediately started to pay attention. Little did I realize that Chris had placed dildos from the cornhole dick-toss we had next to the bar on the back of the porto doors. So, if and when you entered, the dildo would either smack you in the ass or stare you directly in the face depending on your business. I didn't pack much that night.



The 2020 Burning Man theme is The Multiverse, so, with respect to the multiverse theme, how do you feel about parallel universes?

I remember the first time I learned about quantum theory. I was a little kid watching PBS and like most television, it was just to pass the time. However, the moment I started to pay attention to it, the hair on the back of my neck stood up with excitement and feeling like there are so many things that we just cannot comprehend. I firmly believe that there are parallel universes based on the pilot wave theory. There are literally too many probabilities to be contained in one universe.

What did you have planned for Black Rock City 2020?

I had quite a few classified shenanigans in the bag but for the most part, I really wanted to bring out the experimental side of my music and those alike this year. I spent a lot of time in 2019 running around and playing every camp I could and I've come to realize that it's stupidly draining. I want to organize a few days for artists to truly display their experimental side and give it a feeling of quality-over-quantity.

How would your listeners describe your particular DJ sound?

I'm not really sure at this point. I tend to make music under the umbrella of drum and bass (and specifically Halftime). Most people just call it bass music at this point, but bass heads tend to have one rule: fuck genres. If I could put it in to context, a lot of my music is similar to that of wubs, neurofunk bass, warbles, and transformers fucking.

Tell us about your upcoming events and shows.

I'm kind of sad; I had a ton of shows lined up for the year. For starters, I was supposed to play Lost In The Sauce campout with most of the people I call my family: Fuzzy Puddles. These are the folks I collaborate and hold residency with on a show called Bass Waffles. Alongside the four other residents, we also teamed up with some prominent and amazing event crews called Synaptik Events, The Table Productions, Squid Emoji (visuals), Diemt (visuals), The Void (visuals), and of course Synchronistic Sound. This show is my favorite thing of all time. We literally bring out a giant sound rig, hand out free waffles, and pack out this dive bar called The Offbeat in Highland Park. If you're ever in LA, you can visit us on every last Sunday of the every month!

I was going to play Lightning In A Bottle on "The Stacks", The Untz Festival (a Bass Waffles takeover), and Love Long Beach Festival. All of which I was super excited for but everything happens for a reason.

Do you agree that the global COVID19 pandemic quarantine mandate is just an excuse for the government to place new batteries into all the birds?

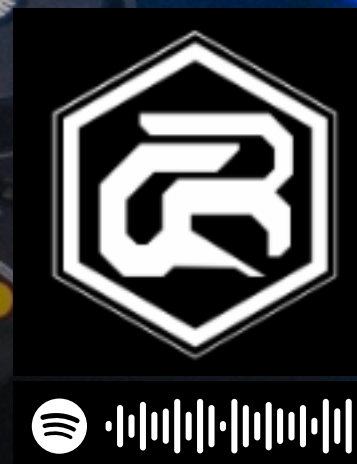
Birds are a lie. However, I do believe that they are solar powered. Geese however. Geese are satan.

Principle of the Month Civic Responsibility

A word on last month's principle.

Attempts at Communal Effort face difficulties when communities' priorities don't align. It is tough to make progress when it can't be agreed upon where to begin or how to proceed. Communal efforts can be most effective when everyone participates, but this can't always be the case. A multitude of circumstances are factors, especially peoples' abilities and resources. Right now we are witnessing one of the largest communal efforts in history, with people around the world quarantining to make it safer for everyone, including Burning Man doing their part by canceling 2020's burn. This is a real demonstration of the 10 Principles guided by Civic Responsibility.

This month's principal: Civic Responsibility.

We generally tend to value a civil society. For this reason, community members who organize events should assume responsibility for public welfare and endeavor to communicate civic responsibilities to participants. They must also assume responsibility for conducting events in accordance with local, state, and federal laws.

One does not often think about a burner's civic responsibility, and many outsiders view Burning Man as a lawless festival where anything goes. It's easy to think that way because of how different it is to the default world. Burning Man has come a long way since their unsafe growing pains of the late 90's, but Principles have been a guiding light to help ensure the best version of this event. The most amazing part is that it takes place under a government, and not somewhere remote without restrictions. Burning Man represents what the world can be if everyone shifts their focus. There are countless resources that Burning Man sets up for safety that are taken for granted until such a time as they are required; emergency services being the most recognizable and under appreciated.

The hope is no one needs these resources, but they are fully prepared for worst case scenarios. Most burners' contact with the Rangers happens when warnings are being issued, but we can benefit from more of a positive outlook as they are yet another line of defense to maintain public welfare on playa. It is safe to assume that some laws are broken during Burning Man—some out of ignorance and some because they are not agreed with—but it's possible for Burning Man to be more than just an escape from traditional social norms, we can also aid with the change of policy in the default world.
